Multi Tiered Systems of Support

The Instructional Support Team (IST) consists of administrators, school counselors and teachers. Using Response to Intervention (RtI), we meet regularly to identify struggling students and develop interventions. We review data from the following categories:

A Attendance

B Behavior

C Course Progress





Data Analysis: Beyond the Report Card

- Attendance: NYS defines absenteeism as loss of instructional time, excused or unexcused. Chronic absenteeism is defined as being absent for 10% of the school year. We will work together, follow the state requirements, use our district policy as a guide and communicate regularly to achieve excellent results.
- **Behavior:** Our students health and social-emotional well being is of utmost importance. Changes in behavior may be an indicator that underlying challenges are present. We review the data regularly to ensure we are supporting all students, in all ways.
- **Course Progress:** We communicate regularly if patterns are emerging that show academic struggle. Our team identifies the potential cause, creates a targeted intervention plan and implements that for a period of time. This process is repeated with added layers as needed.

Scheduling Process


